ORDINANCE NO. 2023-75

An Ordinance of the Pierce County Council Relating to the Pierce County Shoreline Master Program; Amending Exhibit A to Ordinance No. 2022-37s as Required by the Washington State Department of Ecology; Amending Title 18S of the Pierce County Code, "Development Policies and Regulations – Shorelines"; and Setting an Effective Date.

Whereas, the Pierce County Council (Council) adopted Ordinance No. 2013-45s4 on March 10, 2015, establishing Title S of the Pierce County Code, Development Policies and Regulations – Shorelines; and

Whereas, Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 90.58.090 requires the Washington State Department of Ecology (DOE) to review and approve locally adopted Shoreline Master Programs (SMP) before they can become effective; and

Whereas, on May 31, 2018, Pierce County received "conditional approval" of its SMP update as adopted pursuant to Ordinance No. 2013-45s4; and

Whereas, on October 2, 2018, Pierce County adopted Ordinance No. 2018-57s to make the necessary changes to its SMP to satisfy the requirements of DOE to receive final SMP approval and complete the periodic review requirement of RCW 90.58.080(4); and

Whereas, following final approval from DOE on October 12, 2018, Pierce County's Shoreline Master Program Comprehensive Update and Periodic Review became effective on October 26, 2018; and

Whereas, Pierce County adopted Ordinance Nos. 2019-59 and 2020-49 amending Title 18E PCC and Title 18S PCC to resolve a SMP appeal and both Ordinances were subsequently approved by DOE and the Growth Management Hearings Board; and



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Whereas, in June of 2019, through Ordinance No. 2019-32s2, Pierce County 2 appropriated funding to conduct the shoreline inventory, analysis, and characterization work as necessary to support recommended amendments related to: (1) dredged material disposal; (2) fencing within shoreline buffers; (3) prohibitions of piers and docks in marine conservancy Shoreline Environment Designations (SED) or other locations inappropriate due to shoreline geomorphology; and (4) aquaculture for purposes of restoration; and

Whereas, the Council adopted Ordinance No. 2022-37s on December 13, 2022, amending Title 18S PCC, Development Policies and Regulations – Shorelines, through a Locally Initiated Amendment; and

Whereas, in accordance with RCW 90.58.090, the County is required to submit the adopted locally initiated SMP amendments to DOE for review and formal action before the amendments can become effective; and

Whereas, DOE provided Pierce County with Conditional Approval of its Locally Initiated Amendment on October 24, 2023, and has identified several changes to the Pierce County SMP, as adopted through Ordinance No. 2022-37s, that are necessary to comply with current State laws and rules; and

Whereas, Pierce County intends to make the necessary changes to its SMP to satisfy the requirements of DOE to receive final SMP approval pursuant to RCW 90.58.090; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of Pierce County:

Section 1. Exhibit A to Ordinance No. 2022-37s, amending Title 18S of the Pierce County Code, "Development Policies and Regulations – Shorelines," is hereby amended as shown in Exhibit A, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>Section 2</u>. Findings of Fact documenting the actions taken by the Pierce County Council are hereby adopted as described in the Recitals to this Ordinance.

Section 3. If any provisions of this Ordinance or the amendments to Title 18S of the Pierce County Code are found to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

Shoreline Master Program Locally Initiated Amendments:

- 1. On page 1 of Exhibit A, starting on line 21, remove all proposed amendments to PCC 18S.10.065 B. and amend as shown below in shading/strike-through format:
 - "B. Title 18E PCC, Development Regulations Critical Areas. Critical area regulations adopted in compliance with the State Growth Management Act are contained in Title 18E PCC, Ordinance Nos. 2004-56s, 2004-57s, 2004-58s, 2006-103s, 2013-45s4, 2016-52, amended by Ordinance 2017-12s, effective date April 15, 2017, and as amended by Ordinance No. 2021-90s, effective date December 31, 2021, for Chapters 18E.10, 18E.20, and 18E.120 PCC as amended by Ordinance No. 2021-123s adopted on February 1, 2022, and incorporated by reference into the Shoreline Master Program (with the exception of Chapter 18E.70 PCC, Flood Hazard Areas). In the event that an incorporated section—Section of Title 18E PCC is amended, the referenced edition will still apply in shoreline jurisdiction until revised through an approved Master Program amendment."

As amended, PCC 18S.10.065 B. will read as follows:

- "B. Title 18E PCC, Development Regulations Critical Areas. Critical area regulations adopted in compliance with the State Growth Management Act are contained in Title 18E PCC, as amended by Ordinance No. 2021-123s adopted on February 1, 2022, and incorporated by reference into the Shoreline Master Program (with the exception of Chapter 18E.70 PCC, Flood Hazard Areas). In the event that an incorporated Section of Title 18E PCC is amended, the referenced edition will still apply in shoreline jurisdiction until revised through an approved Master Program amendment."
- 2. On page 2 of Exhibit A, line 11, amend the proposed new PCC 18S.30.030.E.4.d. as shown below in shading/strike-through format:
 - "d. Fences four feet or less in height may be allowed in a-the standard shoreline buffer or Lake Tapps setback if they:"

As amended, PCC 18.30.030 E.4.d. would show as follows:

"d. Fences four feet or less in height may be allowed in the standard shoreline buffer or Lake Tapps setback if they:"



- 3. On page 2 of Exhibit A, starting on line 33, amend 18S.40.040 G.3. as shown below in shading/strike-through format to retain the existing Code language:
 - "3. Finfish aquaculture involving net pens for anadromous species is prohibited in all marine waters of Pierce County where there are aquatic reserve areas in place-except as authorized in PCC 18S.40.040 C.16. for enhancement or recovery of native shellfish and aquatic plant species."

As amended, subsection 18S.40.040 G.3. will show as follows:

- "3. Finfish aquaculture involving net pens for anadromous species is prohibited in all marine waters of Pierce County where there are aquatic reserve areas in place."
- 4. On page 3 of Exhibit A, starting on line 6, remove proposed new subsections PCC 18S.40.140 D.2.d. and 18S.40.140 D.2.e. in their entirety and insert the following new subsections 18S.40.140 D.2.d.(1) through (4) as follows:
 - "d. Piers and docks shall be prohibited in the Aquatic Marine Shoreline Environment Designation at various shoreline locations identified as having highly intact ecological functions, relatively few overwater structures, and options for public access or recreation (and two out of three of the following attributes: unstable slopes, high nearshore tidal currents, wide tidal flats) and locations designated as "Marine Shoreline Critical Salmon Habitat" as shown in Appendix J.
 - e. Piers and docks shall be prohibited in the Aquatic Marine Shoreline Environment Designation along the Browns Point and Dash Point shoreline starting at the Tacoma City limits near State Route 509 and continuing west and north to King County as shown in Appendix J.
 - d. Piers and docks shall be prohibited in the Aquatic Marine Shoreline Environment Designation at various shoreline locations as mapped by the County and included in this Master Program as Chapter 18S.70 PCC, Appendix J – Water Access Facility Prohibition Map. These Shoreline locations include the following:
 - (1) Shoreline locations identified as having highly intact ecological functions, relatively few overwater structures, and options for public access or recreation (and two out of three of the following attributes: unstable slopes, high nearshore tidal currents, wide tidal flats), shown in Appendix J as "ESA Proposed";
 - (2) Shoreline locations designated as "Marine Shoreline Critical Salmon Habitat" shown on Appendix J as "Marine Shoreline Critical Salmon Habitat";
 - (3) Shoreline areas that meet the criteria in both (1) and (2) above, shown in Appendix J as "Both Criteria"; and

(4) Shoreline locations identified as having cultural or archaeological resources incompatible with new residential piers and docks. These areas are located along the Browns Point and Dash Point shoreline starting at the Tacoma City limits near State Route 509 and continuing west and north to King County and are shown in Appendix J as "Pierce County Council Adopted"."

As amended, the proposed new subsection 18S.40.140 D.2.d. will show as follows:

- "d. Piers and docks shall be prohibited in the Aquatic Marine Shoreline Environment Designation at various shoreline locations as mapped by the County and included in this Master Program as Chapter 18S.70 PCC, Appendix J Water Access Facility Prohibition Map. These Shoreline locations include the following:
 - (1) Shoreline locations identified as having highly intact ecological functions, relatively few overwater structures, and options for public access or recreation (and two out of three of the following attributes: unstable slopes, high nearshore tidal currents, wide tidal flats), shown in Appendix J as "ESA Proposed";
 - (2) Shoreline locations designated as "Marine Shoreline Critical Salmon Habitat" shown on Appendix J as "Marine Shoreline Critical Salmon Habitat":
 - (3) Shoreline areas that meet the criteria in both (1) and (2) above, shown in Appendix J as "Both Criteria"; and
 - (4) Shoreline locations identified as having cultural or archaeological resources incompatible with new residential piers and docks. These areas are located along the Browns Point and Dash Point shoreline starting at the Tacoma City limits near State Route 509 and continuing west and north to King County and are shown in Appendix J as "Pierce County Council Adopted"."
- 5. On page 6 of Exhibit A, in Table 18S.60.030-1. Shoreline Permit Table, amend the "Residential Water Access Facility (serves 4 or fewer parcels)" row as shown below in shading format to insert a new reference to footnote (11), and on page 7 of Exhibit A, following "Notes," insert footnote (11) as shown below in shading format:
